

# Responsibility Tic-Tac-Toe

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**Target age group:** K-1

**Standards:**

M 6. Positive attitude toward work and learning

BSS 5. Demonstrate ethical decision making and social responsibility

**Objectives:**

1. Students will be able to explain what it means to be responsible
2. Students will give examples of what responsibility looks like
3. Students will be able to make responsible choices when faced with real life scenarios

**Materials**

1. “What if Everybody Did That?” by Ellen Javernick
2. Whiteboard or Chalkboard and markers/chalk
3. Scenario cards and questions
4. Responsibility Bug coloring sheet (optional)

**Time required:** 30 minutes

**Procedures:**

1. Go over rules
2. Ask students if they know what responsibility means
  - a. Define responsibility and give examples
3. Read “What if Everybody Did That?” and stop along the way to discuss
  - a. Discuss book at the end and how the main character was responsible/ not responsible
4. Draw Tic-Tac-Toe on the whiteboard and tape a scenario card in each square
5. Split class into two teams (X and O)
  - a. Explain that each team is trying to get three squares in a row
6. Ask for volunteers to come up and pick a square.
  - a. Read the corresponding scenario/question and have a student/students on that team explain how they would be responsible in that situation
  - b. If done successfully, put an X or an O on that square. The first team to three in a row wins.
7. Time permitting, pass out coloring sheet and have students sit at their tables and color.

## Responsibility Scenario Cards

<p>You told your mom you would feed your dog when you got home from school but you forgot.</p>	<p>You broke the wheel on your brother's new skateboard.</p>
<p>What is one way to be responsible?</p>	<p>You promised your mom you would clean your room when you got home but now you don't feel like it.</p>
<p>You couldn't find a trash can so you threw your trash on the ground instead.</p>	<p>You promised your friend you would play with him at recess but now you changed your mind and want to play with someone else.</p>
<p>Why is it important to be responsible?</p>	<p>You left your folder at school even though your teacher reminded you to bring it home.</p>
<p>Your friend let you borrow her toy, but when she asked for it back you couldn't find it.</p>	<p>You are always really tired in the morning and give your parents a hard time when they try to wake you up. Sometimes you are even late to school because it took you so long</p>
